

Past Centennial Grant



In 2023 Slicktion Culture Productions was awarded a grant from the Commission to produce “**Across the Tracks: A Las Vegas Westside Story**”, a documentary film exploring the entire 118 year history of Las Vegas’ Historic Westside neighborhood.

In January of 2024 we were given the opportunity to debut the film at the Sundance Film Festival in Park City, Utah where it generated a lot of interest from film fans from around the world, who’d never before considered that part of Las Vegas history.

In February, we hosted a premiere at The Plaza Hotel in time for Black History month. The event garnered a plethora of local media attention and drew a capacity crowd.

Interest in the film still remains high, with daily requests from across the country, asking when it will be available to view in their cities.

Proposal Outline

With the support of the Commission, Slicktion Culture Productions will produce a 70-90 minute documentary film detailing the life and architectural achievements of Paul Revere Williams, with a specific focus on his works in Las Vegas and how the city continues to preserve and honor his legacy.

There is no shortage of documentary films about the legendary architect, Paul Revere Williams and why wouldn't there be? The man designed 3000 buildings, including banks, churches, hotels and celebrity homes for the likes of Frank Sinatra, Lon Chaney, Zha Zha Gabor and Lucille Ball & Desi Arnez to name just a few. During the 40's, 50's and 60's he was one of the most sought after architects in America, in a time when the opportunities for black Americans were very limited. He even learned to draw upside down because in those days, for many, it wasn't acceptable for a black man to sit directly next a white clients, even if he was designing their home or a multi-million dollar structure for their business.

While our objective is to give audiences a complete look into his life and accomplishments, this film will focus most on how the City of Las Vegas has continued to preserve his works and legacy. The visitors center at the Neon Museum, NPF's Home & History Tour and the architecture segments of Duck, Duck, Shed will be highlights of the film.



Music is a very important part of Slicktion Culture Productions. An original score gives each film an identity of it's own. For this project we are collaborating with local musician, Phillip G. Henry.


Born in Jamaica and raised in the UK, Phillip G. Henry has spent his entire life dedicated to music.

Concerns & Challenges

*One of the biggest challenges when creating historic documentaries is getting the history correct. Rumors and urban legends connected to famous people and events often take on a life of their own. This does a great disservice, not only to the viewers looking to learn, but to history itself. To remedy this we will rely only on the accounts of official biographers, surviving family members or colleagues as well as Las Vegas architecture and history professionals. We will also research newspapers and magazine articles of the time and any personal writings of Williams himself.

*Young people hate documentaries. It is important to us that our films are able to breakthrough to the “Tik Tok generation” as well as fans of history. We take this into consideration when writing the script, constructing the imagery and selecting the music. We are confident we can keep a jr. high school class as engaged as any college architecture class.

*One of the biggest challenges when documenting history is securing the proper photos and footage to illustrate the desired narrative. To remedy this we will produce high quality animations as well as realistic CGI recreations of Williams' long gone marvels.






The Legacy Continues

In September, 2024, it was announced that Pritzker Award winning architect, Francis Kere' would be the architect of the long awaited Las Vegas Museum of Art, located in downtown.

While Kere's work is internationally recognized, this will be his first permanent structure in the U.S.

When asked about his inspiration for the design, he named Paul Revere Williams.



Production Timeline

October 1, 2024 - research team is briefed on needed information. Research begins immediately.

November 3 - initial meeting between researchers, production staff, director, writers and historic consultants.

November 16 - October 30 - interviewee selection, pre-interviews, historic benchmarks explored, photo and footage search begins.

December 10 - Treatment/outline complete.

December 20 - January 20 - Subjects interviewed.

January 3 - February 3 - Narration Script written. Film score composition selection begins.

February 4 - Trailer/teaser presented at the Pan African Film festival in L.A.

March 7 - Narration Script revisions identified.

Trailer/teaser and press releases distributed locally in celebration of black history month.

March - 17 - Narration Script complete.

Production Timeline

March 25 - Script approved.

April 3 - Film score is selected.

April 7 - 28 - Narration recording. Audio edits.

April 30 - historic CGI renderings begin.

May 1 - archival footage/ music licenses secured.

May 5 - June 5 - editing, animations, CGI, sound design complete.

June 16 - 23 - local press promotional run for Juneteenth.

June 19 - first cut reviewed by production team.

June 27 - producers make final edits. Picture locked.

July 2 - 20 - color grading, audio design and mixing.

July 1 - film is complete and shared with select members of the local press.
Film is turned over to Dr. Siebrandt.

July 16 - press and marketing blitz

August 2 - Film premiere event.
