# Our Neighborhood Association

## **Fremont Street Loft HOA - Downtown Las Vegas**

- 70 homes, 130 residents at 1980 E Fremont Street (15 homes unoccupied, still rebuilding from fire)
- Urban community recovering from the largest residential fire in Las Vegas history
- Strong community bonds forged through shared recovery experience
- Active HOA with committed leadership and engaged residents

## **Project Selection Process:**

- Community feedback identified refreshing the landscape and painting as a high priority
- Board meetings and resident conversations confirmed wide support

# Grant Scope of Work

- Lakeside HOA is looking to replace the antiquated callbox gate entry access system, having had multiple issues with the entry system not working in the past couple of years, remotes and assigned access number failing and residence not being able to access the community.
- We would like to update the old marque that has the incorrect name on it, we are Lakeside Village, current marque monument has Brookview.
- Rock refresh at the main entry of the complex to cover exposed landscape barriers, make the entry more presentable and refresh rocked landscape areas throughout the complex. We would like to paint the main access gates and fencing around the pool area, refresh faded street signs.
- The board of lakeside and residence that attended the HOA meeting all voted on the updates. This would benefit the 89 residence that reside in the community.

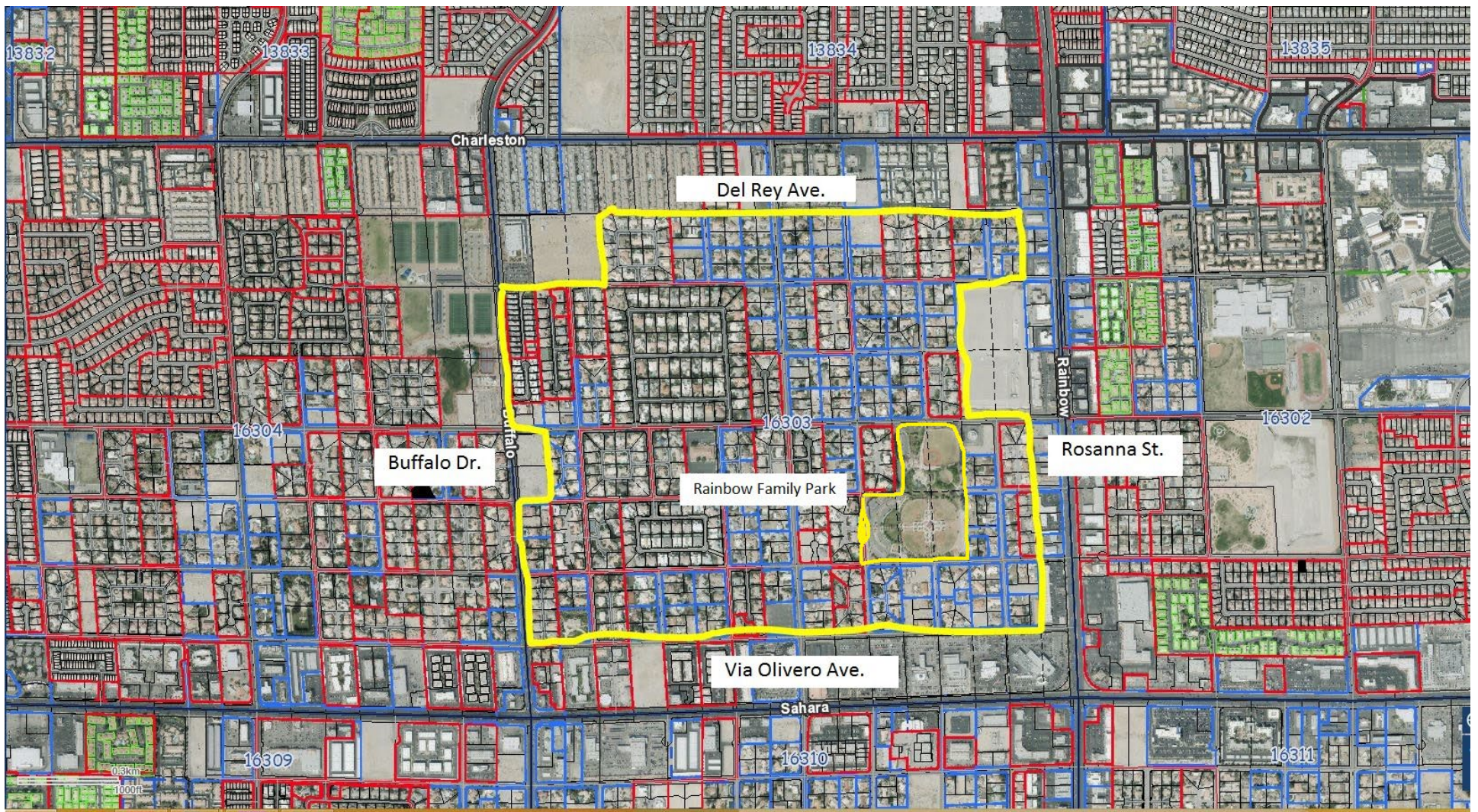

## **RAINBOW FAMILY PARK NEIGHBORHOOD ASSOCIATION**

**MISSION:** Preservation and enhancement of the residential lifestyle of the "Rainbow Family Park" neighborhood (Del Rey Ave. on the North , Via Olivero Ave. on the South, Rosanna St. (approx.) on the East, Buffalo Dr. on the West) – also generally known as "Section 3".

**WHO WE ARE:** We are a group of concerned citizens who live in Section 3 and who are concerned about the preservation and enhancement of the safety and residential nature of our neighborhood. There are approximately 600 homes within the neighborhood and approximately 2,000 residents. We all live within the boundaries of Ward 1 (Councilman Brian Knudsen) in the City of Las Vegas.

**WHAT WE DO:** We sponsor "get-to-know-your-neighbor" events and work to provide awareness and facilitate action whenever there are situations, events, zoning proposals, etc., that impact our residential neighborhood.

## **1. Is Rainbow Family Park Neighborhood Association a Not-for-Profit?**

No. It is simply a neighborhood association registered with the city. The RFPNA was formed in April 2018 to provide an opportunity for the residents of the neighborhood to get together and to get to know one another and to work together on issues impacting the neighborhood.

## **2. Has your neighborhood association received an NPF grant in prior years?**

2018-2019 - \$2,500 to fund a neighborhood “Cinco de Mayo” picnic

2019-2020 - \$4,425 to (1) fund a “Trunk or Treat” Halloween event, (2) purchase computer equipment and software, and (3) stamps for mailings.

2020-2021 - \$4,330 to fund website creation and outreach.

2021-2022 - \$2,500 to fund neighborhood pole signs.

2022-2023 - \$5,000 to (1) fund a Halloween “Trunk or Treat”, (2) purchase logo t-shirts, and (3) logo stickers and name badges.

2023-2024 - \$5,000 to fund a neighborhood event at the Rainbow Family Park in collaboration with the City of Las Vegas and Clark County featuring (1) free taco truck, (2) free ice cream truck, (3) free safety flashlight-key ring size, and (4) three Ring camera systems as door prizes.

2024-2025 - \$5,000 to (1) fund a neighborhood event with free ice cream, door prizes (Ring Alarm Systems, hats, USB drives), and (2) funding for an event tent and a laptop and printer.



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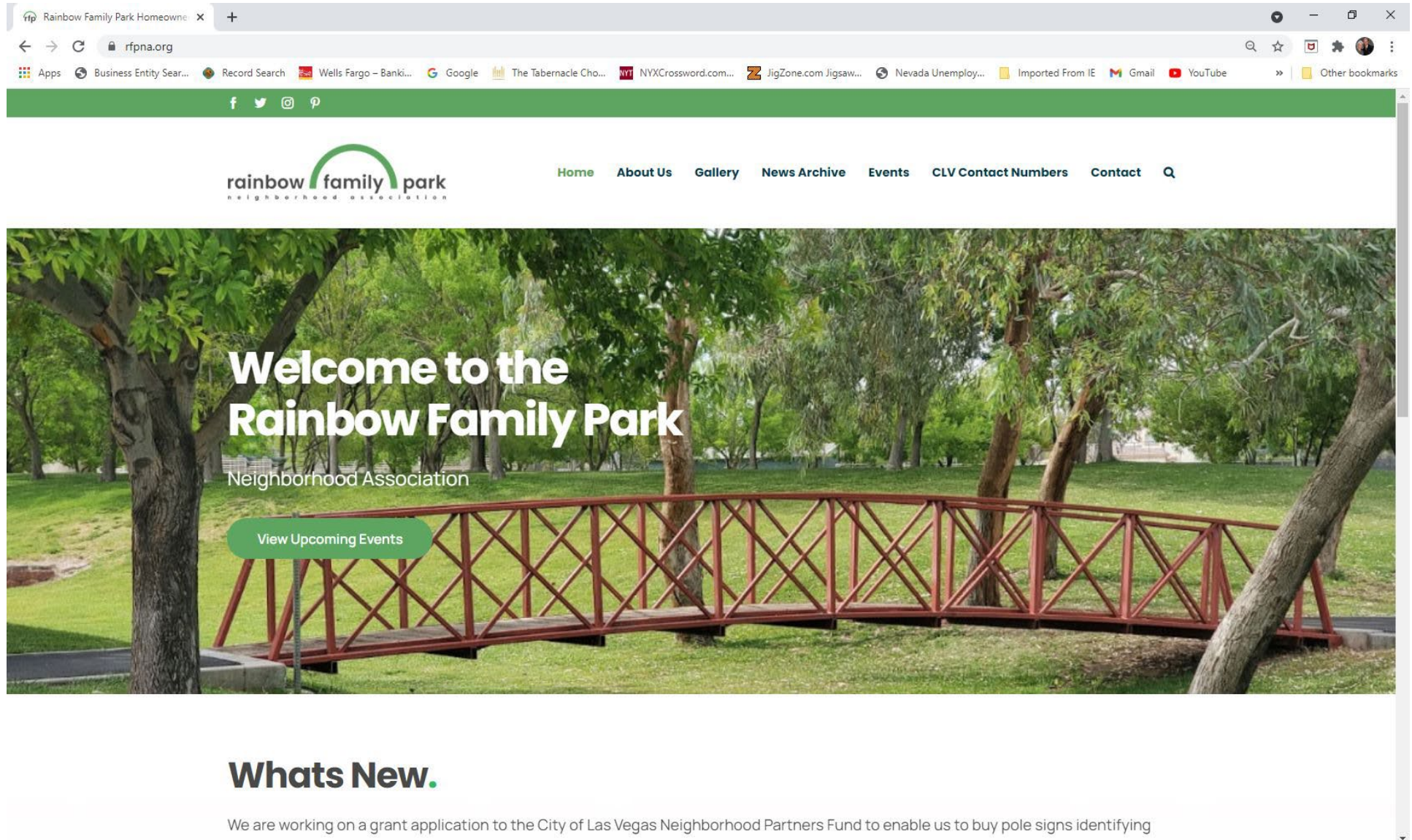

### **3. Describe the project. How will it impact the neighborhood?**

We have previously sponsored (via NPF grant funds) community get togethers, e.g., a Cinco de Mayo picnic for the neighborhood in 2018 and a Halloween "Trunk or Treat" in 2019 which were very well received. We couldn't do any public get togethers in 2020 and 2021 because of COVID-19 and in 2022 we held our first post-pandemic in-person event with another very successful "Trunk or Treat". In 2023 and 2024, we sponsored neighborhood events with free food and other door prizes, including three Ring camera

We would like to have another neighborhood event to continue with the success of the past two year's events with free ice cream and door prizes (including the very popular Ring Alarm Systems We are also seeking funding for software (Adobe Photoshop) so we can develop our own flyers, advertising, etc.

We have approximately 600 homes within the association boundaries and "get-to-know-your-neighbor" events provide an opportunity for neighbors to learn about resources available whenever there are situations, events, zoning proposals, etc., that impact our residential neighborhood.

**4. Describe the project team and other volunteers who will be participating.**

The project team is headed by Margarita Allen and will include; Diane Harrington-RFPNA president, Keith Thomas-secretary, Kevin Flores, and Ana Martinez. All are residents of the neighborhood.

Margarita and Diane will coordinate all efforts with the City and County with regards to co-sponsoring the event. Keith Thomas is responsible for all application preparation and submission, monthly reporting, and coordination with the City regarding payment requests. Kevin and Ana are coordinating the acquisition of any items with logos, and preparing “day of” event signage.

So far, in addition to the 4 members of the project team, we have 3 other neighborhood residents who have volunteered to help carry out the event, either assisting with advertising or with assistance on the day of the event.



## **5. Discuss the funding amount being requested for the project.**

We have sponsored five previous “in-person” events with NPF funds; (1) a “Cinco de Mayo” picnic - 2018-2019 (2) a “Trunk of Treat” Halloween event - 2019-2020, (3) another “Trunk of Treat” Halloween event - 2022-2023, (4) a neighborhood event at Rainbow Family Park featuring free food and door prizes - 2023-2024, and (5) a similar event at the Park with free ice cream and door prizes - 2024-2025 NPF funding.

We are requesting \$5,000 to fund another event similar to last year’s successful event. We are also seeking funds to purchase ice cream, water, door prizes and software for the association secretary. The actual cost estimate total is \$4,791.62 as we wanted to keep the actual amount under the requested amount in the event that there were subsequent changes in pricing.

### **1. Ice cream and water for anticipated 100-125 attendance**

Ben & Jerry’s Ice Cream truck (\$650.00) and water from Smart & Final (\$283.80)

### **2. Ring Camera security systems (\$1,139.97 to be used as door prizes**

We would like to encourage attendance by offering 3 Ring Camera wireless 14-piece alarm security systems as raffle prizes.

### **3. Items to be used as giveaways as an added incentive to attend**

We would also like to provide beanies (\$1,062.25), hoodies (\$946.49), sunscreen (\$430.42, and small round blinkers for runners/bikers (\$179.69), all with the RFPNA logo as an identifier to continue to build awareness of our neighborhood association.

### **4. Computer software**

We would like to purchase Adobe Photoshop (\$99.00) so we can design our own flyers, advertising, etc.

# DESCRIPTION OF TANGLEWOOD HOA



**Tanglewood housing development has 275 homes with approximately 712 residents. Located on Smoke Ranch and Torey Pines**



**The association has previously received the Neighborhood Partners Fund grant and is undertaking a multiphase project to improve the community park and neighborhood appearance.**



**The HOA is currently composed of 6 members**



## THE NPF GRANT HAS ALLOWED US TO UPGRADE AND IMPROVE OUR COMMUNITY

Last year, we successfully completed several key upgrades to Tanglewood Park to improve its safety, aesthetics, and functionality. Using grant funds, we installed deep irrigation systems to support tree health and strengthen the park's ecosystem.



# TANGLEWOOD BEAUTIFICATION

We also repaired the swing set and replaced the wood chips in the playground area to improve safety.

These enhancements directly benefit all 275 homes and 712 residents in our community, and thanks to resident input and volunteer efforts, Tanglewood Park is now a more vibrant and welcoming space for everyone.







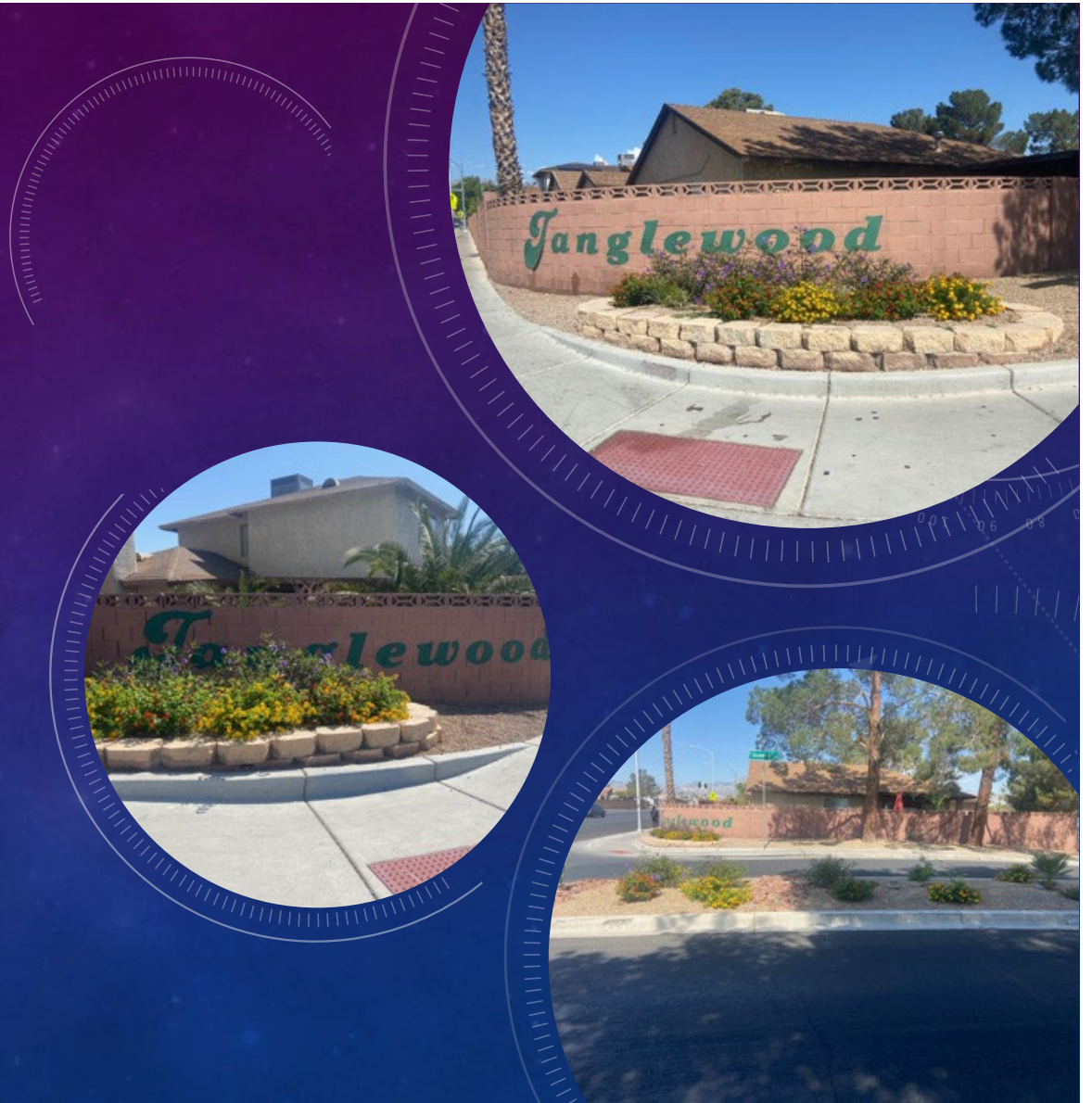
## TANGLEWOOD BEAUTIFICATION

In 2023, the allocated funds were used to remove and replace two dead trees in the park. Additionally, two bushes were planted nearby to help retain moisture and support the trees' hydration.



# TANGLEWOOD BEAUTIFICATION

In 2022 we utilized the grant funds to improve the landscaping located at the center island and both sides of the monument signs.









# TANGLEWOOD BEAUTIFICATION

Also in 2022 we added a bench near the water fountain and replaced the coating on the swing set.



# PREVIOUS NPF GRANT AWARDS

In 2014, our association allocated funds from the Neighborhood Partners Fund grant to procure a jungle gym for our community park.

In 2021, we allocated resources from the grant to install a water fountain that caters to both our two-legged and four-legged friends.

Subsequently, in 2020, we utilized the funds for installing the Dragonfly play equipment. However, due to delays caused by the pandemic, the Dragonfly installation was postponed to 2021

# MULTIPHASE PROJECT TIMELINE

- The association has a 7 year time line to improve the monument sign, center island landscaping and improving the community park by providing
  - Additional swings
  - Park shade structure
  - Deep water irrigation for landscaping (2024)
  - Improving security (2025)
  - Update monument signage (2026)



## 2025 VISION

- This year, we're requesting funds to install a permanent surveillance system at Tanglewood Park—our neighborhood's only shared community space. The project includes two security cameras mounted on the central light post to provide 24/7 monitoring without disrupting the park's aesthetics.
- As usage of the park has grown, so have concerns about vandalism and misuse. While we currently fund a weekly patrol, coverage is limited. Security cameras will offer a continuous, cost-effective solution to deter unwanted activity, protect prior improvements, and enhance residents' sense of safety.

#### Scope of Work / Job Details / Job Description

We will install a total of active deterrent two-way audio cameras on site at the above approximate locations. The cameras will be programmed to alert our guards of any trespassers during our monitored hours. The guards will actively deter any trespassers during the hours that the system is active. The system will be set to record all motion activity 24/7 with approx. 30-45 days of retention for archived video retrievals of any events on the property.

Client is responsible for providing Alpha with a 110v power outlet to Alpha's Nema box (enclosure) and an internet connection with a Static IP address and a minimum upload speed of 2mpbs per camera



# NEIGHBORHOOD IMPACT

1. Enhanced Security – Installation of security cameras provides constant monitoring, deterring vandalism and reducing the risk of crime in the park area.
2. Incident Accountability – Cameras will enable quick identification and resolution of incidents, protecting community investments and maintaining park integrity.
3. Improved Community Safety – With 24/7 surveillance, residents will feel safer and more comfortable utilizing the park during all hours, encouraging greater community engagement.
4. Cost Efficiency – Cameras offer continuous surveillance, making them a more cost-effective and sustainable security solution compared to limited weekly patrols.
